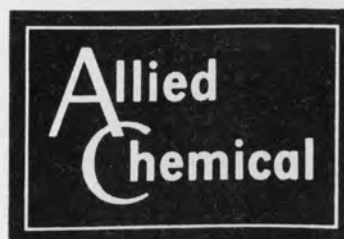

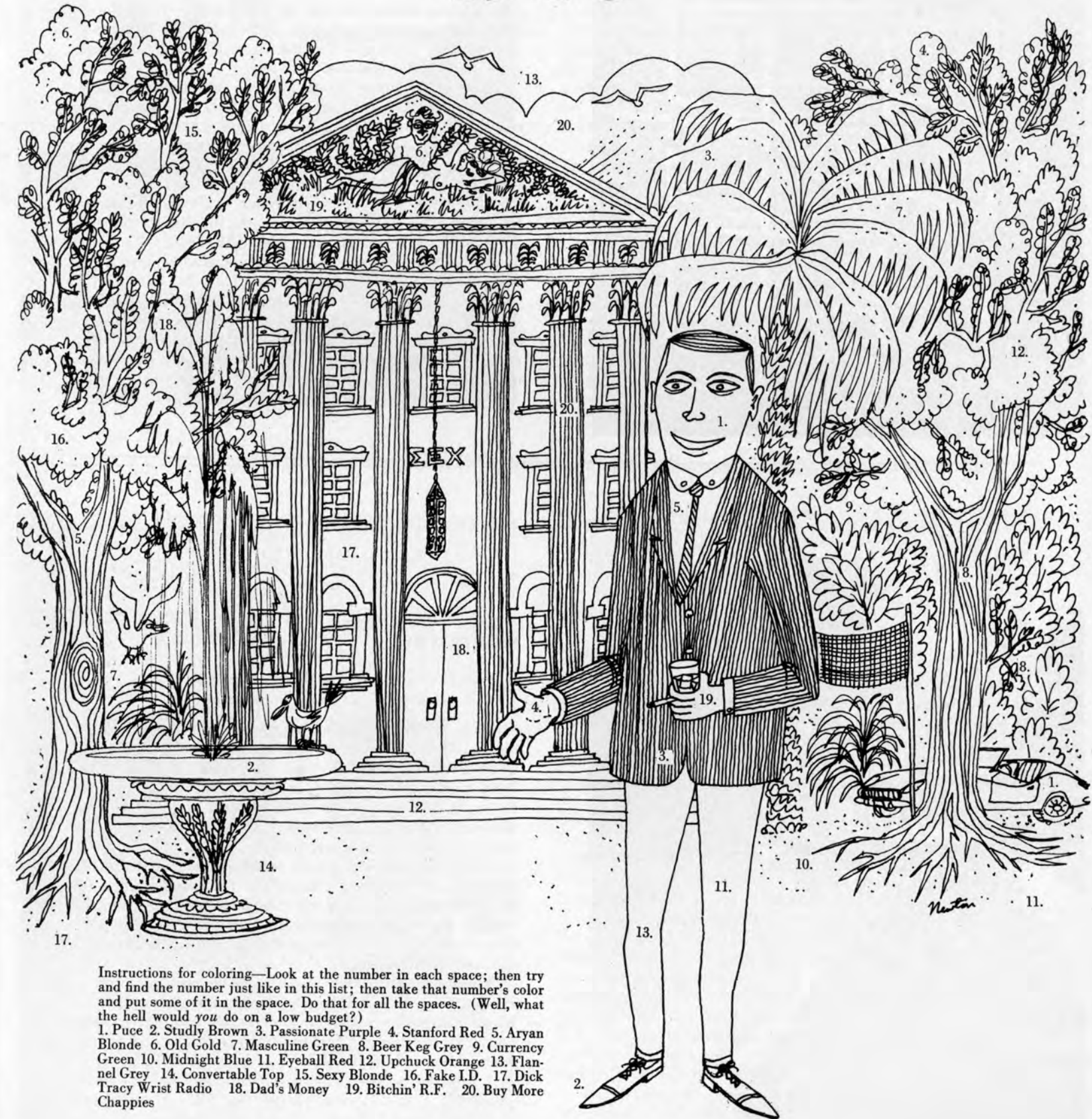
Which just goes to show that humor is where you find it.

PHELTA THI

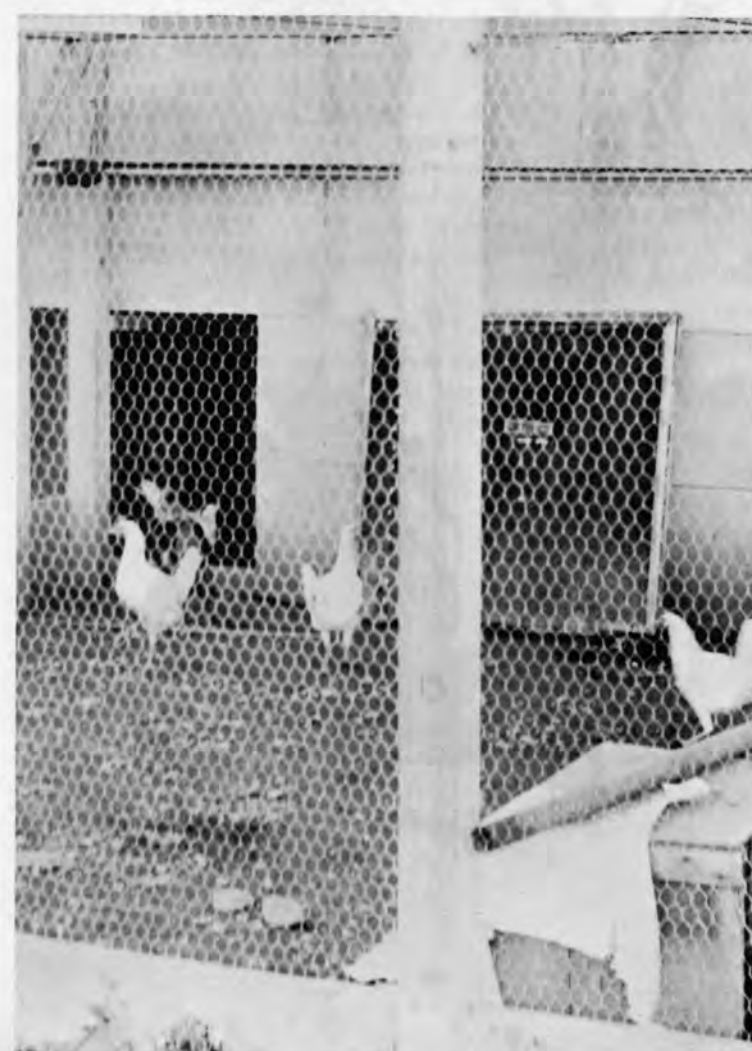
—Motto: "C'est mieux à avoir veçu et mort, quand déjà n'avoir jamais mort."
