WHY GIRLS LEAVE HOME

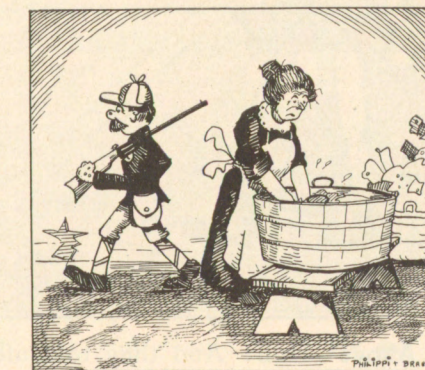

upon it!

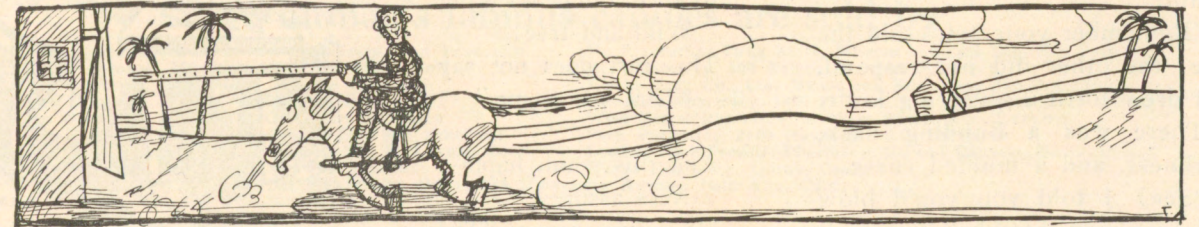
